He received his MD in 1989 from the University of California, San Francisco (UCSF), School of Medicine, and then did his pediatric residency at the New York Hospital/Cornell Medical Center in 1992. He completed his fellowship in the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Clinical Scholars Program at Yale University in 1995.

Dr. Flores is currently the Chair of Pediatrics, Senior Associate Dean of Child Health, Professor of Pediatrics and Public Health Sciences, and the George E. Batchelor Endowed Chair in Child Health at the University of Miami Miller School of Medicine, and Physician-in-Chief at Holtz Children's Hospital in the Jackson Health System. He also is the PI and Director of the APA/NIDDK Research in Academic Pediatrics Initiative on Diversity (RAPID). He is a fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and a member of APS, APA, SPR, the American Public Health Association, and AcademyHealth.

He has been an APS member since 2010, and has been privileged to serve on the APS Council and APS Committee on Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity (CODIE). He recently collaborated with APS on an agreement to fund two RAPID APS Scholars to conduct research in any pediatric subspecialty, which will include having APS members mentor RAPID Scholars and become RAPID National Advisory Committee members.
