## **Andrew Sirotnak, MD**

Andrew Sirotnak, MD, is Professor and Vice Chair for Faculty Affairs, Department of Pediatrics at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. A 1989 graduate of The Sidney Kimmel Medical College at Thomas Jefferson University, he completed internship and residency at Jefferson's teaching affiliates, The Medical Center of Delaware at Christiana Hospital and A.I. DuPont Children's Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware in 1992. He was then recruited to a position as Chief Resident in Pediatrics, Children's Hospital Colorado where he also completed a Fellowship in 1994 in Child Abuse and Neglect with the Child Advocacy and Protection Team at Children's Hospital and The Kempe Center. He is board certified in Pediatrics and Child Abuse Pediatrics and is currently the Child Abuse Pediatrics Fellowship Associate Program Director, having previously served as the program director for the past 27 years. He was Director of the Kempe Child Protection Team and Department Head, Child Abuse & Neglect, Division of Pediatric Medicine from 1996 to 2014 and Interim Director Kempe Center for the Prevention and Treatment of Child Abuse and Neglect from 2009 to 2011.

National service has included work with the American Academy of Pediatrics as Chairperson for the Section on Child Abuse (SOCAN) for two terms and he led the strategic formation of the new Council (COCAN) in 2018. He was selected as a senior faculty mentor in AAP Young Physicians Leadership Alliance Program; and has served the American Board of Pediatrics Child Abuse Subboard, first as a full member for six years and then as Content Development Expert for Child Abuse Pediatrics Maintenance of Certification (MOCA-CAP). He has been recognized with awards for Distinguished Service and Leadership, AAP COCAN, and Outstanding Service "Unsung Hero Award" for his decades of work within the AAP on behalf of children who have experienced abuse and neglect. In addition to the APS and AAP he holds memberships in International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect, International Ombuds Association (IOA) and the International Coaching Federation (ICF).

He was selected for the AAMC Program Planning Committee for the Groups on Diversity and Inclusion (GDI) and Faculty Affairs (GFA). Elected in 2014 to the American Pediatrics Society, he has been in service as abstract and session submissions reviewer since 2008, has facilitated at many abstract and conference presentations, and in his current faculty leadership role, guides and supports faculty nominations for APS and many pediatrics honor societies.
