Joshua Nagler is a pediatric emergency medicine physician at Boston Children's Hospital, and an Associate Professor of Pediatrics and Emergency Medicine at Harvard Medical School. As a faculty member, his academic efforts have focused on medical education, with clinical expertise and scholarship related to teaching pediatric airway management and resuscitation.

He has held numerous positions at Boston Children's Hospital and Harvard Medical School, including his current roles as Associate Division Chief and Program Director for the Fellowship in Pediatric Emergency Medicine, a position he has held for 14 years. He was the former chair of the AAP Subcommittee for Fellowship Directors, and currently sits on the American Board of Pediatrics Sub-board on Pediatric Emergency Medicine. He co-directs a number of CME courses focused on medical education, leadership, innovation, and professional development through Children's Hospital and Harvard Medical School. He has more than 100 academic publications and has edited multiple textbooks in Pediatric Emergency Medicine.

His clinical expertise focuses on airway management and pediatric resuscitation. His scholarship in this area includes original research, textbook chapters, podcasts, and review articles focused on leveraging technology and using innovative approaches to improve health care professionals' skills during pediatric resuscitation. He also teaches nationally and internationally on advanced airway management including directing pediatric instruction for the national Difficult Airway Course.

As metrics of his success as an educator, he has earned more than 20 teaching awards from medical students, residents, fellows, and colleagues. The professional role he values the most is supporting and promoting fellows and junior faculty. His mentees have been recognized with local, regional, and national awards for their academic work in medical education.

Outside of work he loves his time with his family. His wife Jan is a teacher in the Brookline Public Schools, his son Jack is a junior in college, and his daughter Maddie will start law school this fall. His second favorite home is Fenway Park, though he would prefer not to talk about the last few seasons.
