Urgent Opportunity for Pediatric Subspecialty Advocacy

We are reaching out with a **timely advocacy opportunity** to address shortages of pediatric medical subspecialists, pediatric surgical specialists, and child mental health professionals.

Help us advocate for **funding for the Pediatric Specialty Loan Repayment Program (PSLRP)** to ensure children can receive the specialized care they need.

State of Play on Capitol Hill: Congress is gearing up for the annual federal appropriations process when they determine funding for federal programs and agencies – a months-long process that is kicked off with the president's budget proposal. PSLRP is one of many key child health programs that Congress must fund each year through this process. In the months ahead, Congress will develop and debate government funding bills that will ultimately need to be signed into law by the president. It's important to note, this process is *separate* from the budget reconciliation process playing out right now focused on Medicaid, among other programs. Thank you for your continued advocacy on that front.

Background on PSLRP: In large part due to your advocacy, Congress has provided four years of funding for PSRLP. The program provides \$100,000 in loan repayment for pediatric medical subspecialists, pediatric surgical specialists, and child mental health professionals who care for children in underserved areas, addressing critical shortages of these highly trained professionals by lessening financial disincentives for pursuing pediatric specialty training.

The initial investments in PSLRP have been a crucial step forward, but **more funding is needed in FY** 2026 to expand the program's reach.

That's where we need your help:

Letters are circulating in the House and the Senate asking lawmakers to support funding for this program for Fiscal Year 2026.

- The Senate letter is being circulated by Sen. Jack Reed (D-R.I.) and Sen. Bill Cassidy (R-La.), a gastroenterologist. The deadline to sign this letter is **Friday**, **May 16**.
- The House letter is being circulated by Rep. Kim Schrier (D-Wash.) and Rep. John Joyce (R-Pa.), a pediatrician and dermatologist, respectively. The deadline to sign this letter is Wednesday, May 21.

Our goal is to get as many lawmakers as possible to sign these letters. <u>Please consider reaching out to</u> your members of Congress as soon as possible as the deadlines are fast approaching!

Talking points

- These shortages lead to long travel distances for parents seeking care for their children and long appointment wait times for developmental screenings, care for type 1 diabetes, and other essential care.
- Many pediatric researchers are trained as subspecialists and dedicate their careers to research on complex health needs like Type 1 diabetes and autism spectrum disorder. Shortages of pediatric subspecialists may also slow the development of the next generation of treatments and cures for young people.
- The Pediatric Specialty Loan Repayment Program will help increase access to pediatric subspecialists who provide care in underserved and rural areas.

As a constituent, I'm urging you to sign Senator Bill Cassidy and Senator Jack Reed's letter supporting funding for the Pediatric Specialty Loan Repayment Program in FY 2026.

Millions of children reside 1.5 hours or more from needed specialty care. Across the country, there are significant shortages of pediatric subspecialists and child and adolescent psychiatrists, which lead to long travel distances and appointment wait times for developmental screenings, care for type 1 diabetes, and other essential care.

There is also a disparity in the geographic distribution of pediatric subspecialists, resulting in many children in underserved rural and urban areas not receiving timely care. For children with complex medical conditions, their ability to see the right doctor in a reasonable amount of time should not be determined by where they live.

This program will help increase access to pediatric subspecialists who provide care in underserved and rural areas. An increased investment will help expand its reach. It will provide \$100,000 in loan repayment in exchange for three years of providing care for an underserved area, helping address the economic factors that discourage individuals from subspecializing.
